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




## 2018 Solid Tumor General Instructions

## Colon Solid Tumor Rules

- › Changes from 2007 MPH Rules
  - Rectosigmoid & rectum now included in colon rules
- › Histology Tables: reportable and non-reportable
- › M Rules: new anastomosis rules
- › H Rules: Coding polyps



## Breast Solid Tumor Rules

- › Changes from 2007 MPH Rules
- › Tables: site, combination histology codes, histology codes with synonyms and variants
- › M Rules
- › H Rules: DCIS and 90% Rule

  - New terminology, ICD-O codes and behaviors
- › Tables: sites, combination histologies, histologies with synonyms and variants
